#### ITALIAN MINISTERIAL CIRCULAR.

Florence, Nov. 18 (Reuter's Telegram).—Baron Ricasoli has addressed a circular to the Italian prefects on the development of order in the interior of the kingdom. Speaking of Rome, he says:—"The Roman question remains to be solved; but after the fulfilment of the September Convention that question cannot, and must not, be the motive for agitation. The sovereignty of the Pope is placed by the September Convention in the position of all other sovereignties. Italy has promised France and Europe to remain neutral between the Pope and the Romans, and to allow this last experiment to be tried, of the vitality of an ecclesiastical principality, is without parallel in the civilised world. Italy must keep her promise, and await the certain triumph of her right through the efficacy of the principle of neutrality. All agitation for a pretext the Roman question must therefore be discouraged, prevented, and repressed.—The double capacity of the Sovereign Pontiff furnishes some persons with a motive for confounding the political with the religious question, and disturbing with doubts the consciences of the timid. The Italian Government does not desire to lessen the independence of the spiritual chief of Catholicity.—The King's Government, in all its acts, have shown that it recognises no other rules than those of liberty and legality, and it desires the ministers of religion to be neither privileged persons nor martyrs. To the chief of Catholicism is due, no doubt, guarantees for the free and independent exercise of his spiritual ministry. The King's Government, more than any other, is disposed to afford every guarantee for the maintenance of this liberty and independence, being convinced that this may be done without any injury to the rights of the nation."

#### AUSTRIA.

In Austrian diplomatic circles it is confidently stated that, despite the influence of Russia, Count Golouchowsky will not be recalled from the Governorship of Galicia. It is said that the displeasure of Russia at the appointment was fully expected, and was taken into account, but that it was not held sufficient to counterbalance the advantages expected from the appointment. It is not improbable that Baron Beust counsels the recall of the Polish Count, for the sake of disarming the wrath of Russia; but for the present at least, the Emperor is said to remain firm in maintaining the appointment. As the Count ought to return from Vienna to Lemberg to-day, to preside at the opening of the Gallician Diet, it will soon be known whether or not he is to continue in office.

Probate of the will of the most noble Henry Aquis of Lansdowne, K.G., of Lansdowne, Somerset Bowdoin Park, Wilts, and Berkeley-square, granted by her Majesty's Court of Probate to relict, the most noble Emily Jane Mercer, Marchioness of Lansdowne, daughter of the Comte de Flah and the Baroness Keith and Nairne, the sole executrix and universal legatee. The personalty was under £80,000. His lordship died July 5, 1866 his own residence, Lansdowne House, Berkeley square, at the age of 50. His will, which is brief, bears date February 12, 1863, and is contained in these words:—"I give and bequeath to my wife Emily Jane Mercer, Marchioness of Lansdowne all my personal estate and effects of every kind, I appoint her executrix of my will, and guardian my children during their respective minorities."

One of the leaders of the ritualistic movement "sacrificed his strong predilection on the alta charity," by conceding some of the obnoxious innovations which he had introduced into the service St James's, Brighton, of which he is perpetual guardian.
