to PLAYTHING.—There is at present a philosophical plaything which is called Pharaoh's servants in the drawing, and is, unfortunately, more innocent. It consists of two small leaves of paper, one of which is shining, the other dull. The shining leaf is placed on the former, and immediately appears. M. Niepce gives the following directions for preparing the leaves:—An ink print is selected, and effaced with a solution of mercury; it is then rinsed with water, and allowed to dry. So much for the first leaf. The second must be impregnated with a solution of hyposulphite of soda, or else with byposulphite of soda. By moistening the leaf so impregnated with the solution, the print immediately revived—*Galigani*.
