### DUBLIN WOOL MARKET.

(GANLY AND PARKER'S CIRCULAR).

Dublin, Friday, 8th June.

We deem it due to Irish wool growers to give the following information on the state of the trade:— At one o'clock yesterday, when we wrote our weekly note, no sales could be effected, by reason of buyers demanding unreasonable reductions, farmers declining to concede. After that hour, halfpenny per lb. reduction on previous rates was made, and about half of the quantity on market changed hands; the remainder was stored for a future day.

Our English accounts this morning are not so favourable; for were it not for the suspending of Agra Co's Bank, we had reason to expect a reduction in the price of money to 8 per cent. This is at present expected, it is expected by next Thursday.
