VIENNA, APRIL 25.—The *Morgen Post* publishes a telegram, according to which the Emperor Napoleon is declared to the Italian Cabinet that he will in no way assist Italy in case she should attack Austria. The *Morgen Post* adds that this news comes from an authentic source.

AUSTRIA AND PRUSSIA.

VIENNA, APRIL 25.—The Minister of Police has notified that the Austrian *visa* will again be necessary for persons crossing the Austro-Italian frontier.

The Vienna Cabinet, it is said, addressed a circular despatch to Prussia and other European Courts, informing them that the Austrian armaments are rendered necessary by the proceedings of the Italian Government. The despatch adds that Austria, relying upon the word of the Prussian King, considers any measure of defence against Prussia unnecessary.
