LIVERPOOL CORN MARKET.

Market fully attended. Wheat sells slowly at about 1d. reduction. Flour 1s lower, some forced sales having been made since Tuesday. Oats and oatmeal unchanged. Maize, from temporary scarcity 1s. 6d. dearer. Imports Inland, &c.—Malt 57; oats, 1,891; beans, 62; Indian Corn, 2; oatmeal, 751 loads; flour, 23 sacks. Foreign—Wheat, 4,575; Indian corn, 1846; flour, 2,859 sacks.

GLASGOW CATTLE MARKET.

The number of cattle at this day's market was larger than last week. Trade dull and prices lower for all, except the extreme top, which, being very scarce, brought former prices. The supply of sheep was small, trade dull, and prices lower. Prices—Top oxen, 68s. to 70s. 0d. per cwt.; secondary, 63s. to 65s. per cwt.; middling and inferior, 50s. to 56s. per do.; mutton, 8d. to 9½d. per lb.

DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET.

Beasts in market, 1,624; sheep and lambs, 2,972; calves, 49; stores, 44, of all ages and weanlings. The best quality of heifer and ox beef touched, in some instances, close on 70s. per cwt., but every quality suffered considerable depression, owing to the restrictions on such stock going to the manufacturing districts. The London market is glutted with stock and dead, from over speculation on the part of foreign and home buyers. Exporters bought good stock more freely for the interior markets of England, and hope to take them after Monday's Liverpool market, on the 25th instant. Mutton was in fair supply at last quotations, 10d. to 10½d. per lb. Store sheep scarce, and much sought for. Veal, 10d. to 11d. per lb. We note still a large number of beasts that ought not to be on market, being now neither fat nor fit for stores. Wool is still in better demand, and prices again slightly advanced. For combing fleece, 2s., and skin of present pluck, 1s. 9d. On the whole, all things concerning the farmers wear a healthy aspect.
