Yesterday morning, at nine o'clock, the remains of the Rev. Francis Mahony, so well and favourably known as "Father Prout," and so long and so justly admired as the able, talented, the witty and genial Irishman and scholar, whose name adds one more to the long list of those gifted sons of Ireland, who have shed a brilliant lustre on their old country, were consigned to their last earthly resting place, in the family vault of St. Mary's Shandon, Cork, amid the deep regret of a numerous cortege of sorrowing relations and friends.

At the Parkhurst Barracks, Isle of Wight, a youth not more than 18 years of age, received 50 lashes, and six months hard labour for no greater offence than giving way to an unfortunate ungovernable temper. The punishment took place about the 13th instant. So revolting was the spectacle that more than a dozen of men in the front rank who witnessed this act of cruelty dropped down in a dead faint.

A singular accident occurred at Southsea on Tuesday. A little girl, nine years of age, named Louisa Bowyer, was sent with a glass bottle to fetch a pint of stout for her mother. On her return she fell down, the bottle broke, and its jagged edge entered the main artery in the child's neck, and caused her almost immediate death.
