THE EAST.

Paris, March 1.

The Paris papers publish intelligence from Athens
dated 21st instant, via Marseilles, according to which
the British consul in that capital had despatched
some English gunboats to Heracleion to prevent any
massacre of the Cretans by the Ottoman troops. The
same papers publish news from Jerusalem to the 10th
instant, stating that the Musulmans in that city
had intended to massacre the Christian inhabitants
on the pretext of the high price of provisions.

Good attendance of country millers. Market lower
for home grain without much supply. Foreign wheat
met steady demand at the reduced currencies of last
Tuesday, or 1s 6d lower than this day week. Irregular
corn slow at 1s per qr. reduction. Flour irregular
and difficult to quote. Sales have been made at 1s
to 2s per sack under extreme rates of last week.

DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET.

NUMBER ON MARKET.—Beasts, nominally fat,
1,332; sheep, 3,629; veal calves, 49. Of the number
given as "fat," a large proportion were either half
fed or stores. The majority of these on market were
forced there, by failure of turnips. Of the sheep,
also, a number were only fit for stores. The cattle
trade, for the past four weeks, has been anything but
remunerative to dealers, and they, consequently,
bought with much caution to-day; highest price of
prime beef, 70s; second quality, 65s; old cow and
coarse, 60s per cwt; mutton, 7½ to 8½ per lb;
veal, 10d to 12d per lb—one calf sold for ten guineas.

DUBLIN WOOL MARKET.

Wool has been, for some time past, neglected, and
and nothing doing within the last week; some parties
forced sales of small lots at a reduction, but
owners of large lots would not submit. Last week's
tone in England for combing sorts was better, and
we anticipate a wholesome reaction.
