After taking on board 800 of the Royal Marines and three Field Officers, the Caledonia and the Lord Clyde proceeded on Thursday to Bantry Bay. The Royal Marines will be landed at Cork.

The 84th Regiment under Colonel Lightfoot, C.B., left Malta, on the 2nd of March, in the troopship Tamar, for Jamaica.

The armoured screw frigate, Lord Clyde, Captain Roderick Dew, C.B., sailed from Spithead on Thursday, at 4 p.m., for Ireland, with a strong detachment of Marines on board drafted from the Portsmouth Division.

The screw steamship, "Caledonia," 80, Captain the Hon. Fitzgerald, A. C. Foley, was ordered on Thursday to the Sound, where she will embark detachments of Marines for conveyance to Ireland.

The muster roll of the Royal Marines embarked includes, 4 captains, 8 subalterns, 16 sergeants, 16 corporals, 4 drummers, and 352 privates, in all 400.

On this afternoon a troop of the Carbineers, under command of Captain Hall and Cornet Rickards, proceeded from the Ordnance Barrack on to Rathkeale, there to be stationed during the Fenian rising.

In consequence of information being received by the authorities at Portobello Barracks, on Thursday, that a large body of men had been seen in the neighbourhood of Killakee, County Dublin, and that an attack was expected on Mrs. White's house, a troop of the Scots Greys, under Captain Phillips, and a company of the 92nd Highlanders, under Lieutenants M'Callum and Dashwood, were dispatched with all haste to Killakee. On arriving there they were informed that large parties of rebels had been seen in the vicinity during the morning, but had since retired into the hills behind Killakee. The troops accompanied by Mr. Guinness, JP, immediately started in pursuit. They did not succeed in overhauling the rebels, but captured a large spring cart which they found standing with his horse and driver. The cart contained a large quantity of loose powder, 400 or 500 Enfield cartridges, together with the plunder obtained at the police station at Stepside the previous evening. Immediately afterwards the troops overtook a respectably-dressed man, who, on being searched, was found to have a nine-barrelled revolver and a stiletto in his possession. He was made fast to one of the trooper's saddles by a collar-chain and given over to the Rathfarnham police. The party then returned.

LATEST INTELLIGENCE.

BY TELEGRAPH.

A flying column of infantry, engineers, and military train arrived at the Junction last night under Col. M'Neill, and proceeded to Tipperary to attack the insurgent camps there on neighbouring hills.

The Commander of the Fenians at Killeacle has been captured.

A body of insurgents, 3,000 strong, moved on Ballincollig, near Cork, yesterday, but when the military went out to meet them they dispersed.

The insurgents seem to be collecting on all the hill sides in Tipperary and on the Galtee mountains, and troops are being concentrated there to disperse them.

LONDON CATTLE MARKET.

To-day's market was but moderately supplied with beasts. The best breeds moved off steadily, at Monday's prices; otherwise, the demand was heavy, at barely late rates. The top figure was 5s. 2d. per 8 lb.

The sale for sheep was very inactive, on former terms. The best Downs and half-breds sold at 6s. to 6s. 2d. per 8lb. Lambs were firm, at 7s. 6d. to 8s. per 8lb. The few calves in the market found buyers at full prices, viz., from 5s. to 6s. per 8lb. The inquiry for pigs, although the supply was small, ruled heavy, on former terms.
