LATEST INTELLIGENCE.

FRENCH AND PRUSSIAN ARMIES.

An article which has just appeared in the *Revue des D. G. Mondes*, from the pen of General Changarnier, is exciting a certain attention. The observations which he publishes relate more especially to the new plan proposed for the reorganization of the military force in France, and incidentally to the present position of Prussia as created by the war of last year. As to the Prussian army, General Changarnier observes:—"In spite of its rapid victories over the valiant Austrian troops, commanded by generals worthy of them in respect to courage, but whose tactics were not crowned with success, the Prussian army, very young, supported by a reserve suddenly called out from sedentary occupations, showed itself unfitted to support the fatigues of a long war. In a campaign of only a few days, it strewed the road with its laggards, and encumbered the hospitals with its sick. Before an enemy tenacious, obstinate, disputing foot by foot the soil of the country, it would have been destroyed, in spite of its uncontested bravery, long before the accomplishment of its task." As to the landwher on the Prussian model, General Changarnier says:—"That institution is the basis and the reserve of those armies which, in a few weeks of summer and in very rich countries, lose many more men by prolonged marches and bivouacs than by the fire and sword of the enemy. They are called economical armies, but they do not save much for the population, which could not maintain them long in their original strength." The conclusion which he arrives at this:—"Woe be to France, if, breaking the chain of her glorious traditions, she were to discontinue having an army more powerful by its organization than by its numbers. Were those improvised soldiers, the 50,000 men who, under the orders of General Bonaparte, in fifteen months beat out of the field the Piedmontese and the three Austrian armies! Were they new levies, the 130,000 soldiers who left the camp at Boulogne to rapidly blockade Ulm, and who, a few days after, entered Vienna, having only some of their wounded to send to the hospital? Were these men only half citizens and half soldiers, who, during two winters, held in the trenches of Sebastopol, and, without their courage being damped by several fruitless assaults, made, at length, one which was decisive? Were those admirable soldiers only just recruited from the studio, drawing-room, or the plough, who, in Mexico, never made a calculation of distance or of the number of their enemies?"

AUSTRIA AND THE LUXEMBURG QUESTION.

The *Presse* of Vienna publishes another article, in which it insists on the obligations of Austria to maintain neutrality in case of a conflict between France and Prussia. The Austrian Journal repeats that the Vienna Cabinet has serious reasons for watching very attentively the more than suspicious movements of Russia in the East. If Austria were to commit the fault of uniting herself to Germany in order to break the Power of France she would be to see the Russian Government relieved from all counterpoise, destroy the Turkish Empire, and enrich itself with the spoils, without the Vienna Cabinet being able to interpose any obstacle.
