General Sweeney has disbanded the negro militia in Augusta, Georgia. General Scott, commanding at Charleston, has issued a circular advising the freedmen to be less violent in demanding supposed rights.

Preliminaries for the registration of voters for Southern districts of America are progressing. It is reported the Government disapprove of the course taken by Sheridan in removing Louisiana officers.

The *Memorial Diplomatique* publishes a telegram from Berlin, stating that Prussia is determined not to evacuate Luxemburg under any circumstances, and that in official circles in Berlin such evacuation would be considered equivalent to the abdication by Prussia of the position she has acquired by recent events.

The Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company have announced the issue of return tickets to and from India, with a reduction of 20 per cent. on the return voyage within six months.

The Rev. L. Mewan is stated to have been appointed Roman Catholic bishop of Bombay, in place of Dr. Steins, promoted to the archbishopric of Calcutta.

General Schofield in Virginia, has announced that only persons who have taken the oath to support the Federal Constitution will be appointed officers previous to the state convention.

A very bad symptom is that the *Moniteur* to-day fixes the price of a substitute at 3,000f., instead of 2,000f., which was the rate last year. So much as 3,000f. for a man has never before been paid in time of peace.

The Judiciary Committee in Washington has suspended the impeachment investigation until May.

The *New York Herald* says the union meeting in Smyth County, Virginia, which was dispersed by armed men, afterwards organised a meeting and passed resolutions denouncing Congress. General Schofield being informed of the affair sent an officer to investigate it.

The barmaids of the English restaurant at the Universal Exhibition have excited a violent jealousy in the bosoms of the fair portion of the French visitors. The *blondes filles d'Albion* attract from morning to night a host of *merveilleux Creves*. N.B. The Creve has supplanted the *gandis* in the new dictionary of the French fashionable slang.
