General Von Roon, the Prussian Minister of War will shortly leave for a southern climate to recruit his health. The duties of his office will be provisionally administered by General Podbielski, his probable successor, in the event of the Minister finding it indispensable to prolong his absence beyond the beginning of the spring. General Roon, though he scarcely did any field duty is suffering from the hardships of the war. It is said that for four weeks previous to the outbreak of hostilities he did not know what it was to sleep in his bed.

Zeidler's Correspondenz, a semi official Berlin paper says that the French diplomats in Southern Germany are again busily employed in recommending an alliance with France as the great Catholic and Conservative Power. However successful they may be elsewhere while Prince Hohenlohe is in office at Munich they will not estrange Bavaria from the Confederacy. Early this morning the loyal and patriotic Prince told the Bavarian Chamber that, in the event of a crisis Bavaria would stand by Prussia, and defend its right.

A marriage between the Crown Prince of Holland and Princess Frederika, eldest daughter of the King of Hanover is contemplated at the Hague, and highly approved at Paris. If the settlement between King George and the King of Prussia is ratified Berlin Chambers, the Princess is expected to have a dowry of 2,000 thalers.
