There was about an average attendance at our market this morning. Demand for wheat was only moderate. But samples of English could not be obtained at less money. Damp and inferior sorts declined 1s per quarter. Foreign unchanged. Flour, slow sale, at a reduction of 6d per sack. Oats and oatmeal rather in favour of buyers. English and Egyptian beans declined 9d per quarter. Indian corn 6d cheaper.

GLASGOW CATTLE MARKET.

There was a large supply of cattle at market today, and of sheep less than last week. Beef difficult to sell at last week's prices. Sheep were easily disposed of, at an advance of from 2s to 3s per head. Top Scotch oxen, 74s per cwt.; Irish, 60s to 70s; secondary, 65s to 68s; middling and inferior, 52s 6d to 50s; mutton, 7d to 9d per lb.

DUBLIN CORN MARKET.

(Pim, Perry, and Co.'s Report.)

Attendance thin. Market continues stagnant, and buyers hold off. Home grain dull. Wheat 6d to 1s, barley and oats 6d lower than last week. Foreign wheat could have been bought 6d lower had buyers appeared. Indian corn 1s per qr. lower. Flour at a stand, buyers waiting till prices are settled. Oatmeal dull, and lower to sell.

DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET.

Number on Market—Fat cattle, 1,535 beasts; 4,416 sheep; 46 veal calves. Store Cattle—Not exactly ascertained, but were in large numbers and better demand.

Slow sales, except for best quality, were the rule of the fat market. A large proportion of those shown were neither fit to sell nor fit at any time to have been tied up. It is puzzling to think how ignorance and amateur nonsense still exists in Irish farming, after all the experience we have had, and the precedents set by a limited number in almost every locality who do adopt the improved system—applying genuine skill and capital. Fifty per cent of the stock shown to day as "Fat Stock," were wholly unfit for their position; clearly proving us as yet far behind our neighbours. The few prime heifers, and bullocks well finished sold freely at 70s to 75s per cwt; second and inferior 50s to 60s. Best aged wethers, 8d ewe, 7d to 8d; veal, 9d to 10d per lb.
