#### ENNIS UNION.

The usual weekly meeting of the Board took place on yesterday, instead of this day, in consequence of a special meeting having been summoned for the purpose of having the rate books signed previous to the 1st of May. The Guardians present were: - Thos. Greene, Esq. JP, in the chair; Michael Kerin, JP; John Leary, John Lyons, and Daniel O'Keefe, Esqrs.

After the minutes had been read and affirmed, The Clerk informed the Board that he had received a communication from the Commissioners relative to the case of Mrs. Hourigan, who had been allowed to leave the house and go to service whilst her three children were kept in the workhouse, the mother agreeing to pay 1s per week out of her wages. The Commissioners informed the Guardians that such an arrangement was illegal and contrary to the 25th article of the workhouse rules.

The relieving officer, in consequence of this communication, was directed to give Mrs. Hourigan notice that she should withdraw her children from the house.

A letter was then read from the Commissioners approving of the appointment of Mr. George Smith as Relieving Officer for the Newmarken-on-Fergus district.

The Clerk announced that all the rate books had been signed except the one for the Killone division, which could not be done in consequence of the irregular manner in which the holdings in that district were apportioned. The revising valuator was on the lands making the necessary revision.

Mr. Kerin observed that the Tiermaclam district was curiously circumstanced. There appeared to be great irregularity with respect to the different boundaries of the holdings.

Mr. Lyons said that such was always the case. It was a zig-zag sort of applotment, one man's land running into another's, and some even held a portion of their holdings in the centre of other men's farms. It would be a great advantage, he thought, to have the boundaries properly adjusted.

The Chairman observed that they would merely confine themselves that day to accepting tenders for milk, meat, coals, and other necessaries. The other contracts should remain over until the next day of meeting.

The milk tenders having been opened, the following contractors were declared: - Michael Quin, 10 pottles at 1s 1/4d; Pat Linnane, 8 pottles at 12 1/2d; Michael Davoren, 6 pottles at 12 1/2d; Daniel Greene, 10 do, at 13d; Edward Gallery, 10 at 13d; R. Keemey, at 13d.

The tenders for meat were John Considine, 7d per lb. for beef and mutton for 12 months; Pat Brennan, 5 1/2d per lb for beef and mutton; and A. M'Mahon, 5d per lb for beef and 6 1/2d for mutton.

P. Brennan's tender was accepted at 5 1/2d, as being the lowest.

Mr. Shaw was declared contractor for supplying English coal at £1 1s 6d per ton, and Scotch at £1 1s per ton.

The Board then adjourned.

The 15th (the King's) Hussars and the 17th cers at Aldershot, have commenced their troop petition for prizes and badges. The dexterity in the use of the Cavalry weapons by both regiments has been highly praised. Prizes are awarded three men out of every 50 who prove their superiority after repeated encounters on horseback. The best swordsman in each troop receives 2d per extra, and the cross sword badge in worsted. It is understood that in the regimental competition for the year the competitors will engage with equal weapons against sword, and lance against lance, as on former occasions, lance against sword *versus*. The champion in this competition will receive 3d per day extra, and the badge of the sword gold. Great interest is evinced in the competition and the results both by participants and spectators. The troops at Aldershot have been engaged in ordinary spring drill during the past week. The tenant General the Hon. Sir James Yorke Scarlett, K.C.B., commanding the division, had ordered a day of the infantry on Wednesday, and of the cavalry on Thursday, but, owing to the unfavourable weather a counter-order was issued.

Yesterday a detachment of 100 non-commissioned officers and men belonging to the various companies comprising the 2nd battalion of infantry at Chatham arrived at that garrison from Gravesend, after completing their course of ball practice, at the Government rifle range, previous to embarkation. In the afternoon a similar detachment of the same battalion left the garrison and marched to Gravesend to go the course of rifle instruction.
