LIVERPOOL CORN MARKET.

Small attendance, and limited business in everything. Wheat and flour nominally as on Tuesday. Oats, oatmeal, beans, peas, and barley rather easier. Mixed maize down to 42s 6d, and little done in it.

Imports, inland, etc.—Oats, 473; Indian corn, 125; oatmeal, 1,365 loads; flour, 1,785 sacks, 1,635 barrels; foreign wheat, 4,941; barley, 451; oats, 1,653; beans, 4,320; peas, 4,521; flour, 400 sacks and 2,906 brls.; Indian corn, 2,791.

WAKEFIELD CORN MARKET.

Wheat trade dull, and to effect sales rather lower rates must be submitted to.

MANCHESTER CORN MARKET.

Our market this morning was but slenderly attended by buyers, and wheat and flour met a slow sale at the currencies of this day s'night. Oats, oatmeal, and beans were in moderate demand at fully late rates. Indian corn was 61 per qr. dearer.

GLASGOW CATTLE MARKET.

The number of cattle was less than last week. Trade again dull, and prices unchanged. The supply of sheep was larger, and sales dull, at lower prices. Top Scotch Oxen, 73s to 74s; Irish, 67s 6d to 70s; secondary, 60s to 65s; middling and inferior 50s to 57s 6d; sheep, 6d to 8d per lb.

BIRMINGHAM CORN MARKET.

Better supply of English wheat, for which buyers offer 1s less money, but this reduction is not generally accepted. Nothing doing in foreign wheat. Barley, oats, beans, and peas all very dull, and in some instances lower prices were accepted. Spring corn dull, but not cheaper.

DUBLIN CORN MARKET.

(Pim, Perry, and Co.'s Report.)

Weather mild and genial. Thin attendance, and limited supplies of home grain, prices steady. Foreign wheat little business, and prices unaltered. Indian corn easier to buy. Flour—Few buyers at the moment. Sellers hold firmly, and extra qualities scarce. Oatmeal steady.

DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET.

Fat Cattle—1,266 beasts; 3,796 sheep; 50 veal calves.

The high-flowing wave of beef and mutton prices having receded to a level, we have no excited prices, such as the two first in this month. Supply found its way rapidly to meet the demand. 65s to 70s per cwt. ruled our heifer and ox beef to-day; but in some cases, for home consumption, 72s 6d was obtained; cow beef 60s to 65s. Prime wedder mutton 7½d to 8d; good ewe 7d to 7½d and 7½d. Veal 9d to 10d per lb. Stores not brought forward numerously, on account of recent severe weather, and very little doing.

Wool steady, at 1s 9d for mixed parcels; all hogg a shade over. Short fleece neglected. Skin (present pluck) 1s 5d to 1s 6d per lb.
