The Very Rev. Dr. Magee, Dean of Cork, writes to remove a false impression which some appear to have derived from certain passages in a speech recently delivered by him at Salisbury. That impression was to the effect that he had advocated, or at least acquiesced in the proposed disendowment of the Irish Church. What he did advocate was, that if the State deprived the Church of its endowment, it should leave the Church free from State control,—that it should not be deprived of the great advantages of State connexion while the lesser but still real disadvantages of that connexion should still be imposed on it. This he contends for in the event of the utmost efforts of Churchmen to retain the endowment proving a failure; but he in no sense abandons the principles of the Church Establishment.

A man named Lee, who was living apart from his wife, made his way to the house in which she was residing, and on her repeating afresh her determination not to live with him, he seized her and beat her, and was apparently about to inflict a wound upon her with a knife, when their daughter, a girl sixteen years of age, came to the rescue, and enabled her to escape. Lee then turned upon the daughter, and inflicted a wound on her throat, and subsequently attempted to commit suicide. His wounds are such that he is not expected to recover.
