Earl of DERBY moved the second reading of presentation of the People Bill. He said that ill of 1832 had been carried amidst a hurricane of enthusiasm and excitement, which prevented its improved and rendered as perfect as it might be. He would have been content to leave the entation of the people as it was then, but the Crown, as well as Parliament, was pledged to a change. He read Mr. Gladstone's want of conciliation last year, intended that, although the present bill was extensive in its operation, it afforded a more interesting place. Having defended the lodger since, he condemned Earl Grey's amendment as contradictory, and as disrespectful to the House of Commons.

Mr GREY said that, in moving the resolution of which he had given notice, his object was not to ask the House to absolutely reject the measure, but to protest against it as he considered it to be, but from the necessity of considerably amending it in Committee. He believed that fully two-thirds of the members of Commons coincided with him in that opinion. The debate was continued by Lord Ravensworth, Earl of Morley, Lord Stratford de Redcliffe, Lord Rutland, and the Earl of Carnarvon, who thought that he was no covert to the new Conservative Government. He must protest against it as loudly as he could; otherwise, he would do penance in sackcloth and ashes, and confess that his whole political life had been one great hypocrisy. Mr Beauchamp, Earl Granville, and others having spoken, the debate was adjourned until this evening.

**HOUSE OF COMMONS - YESTERDAY.**  
In reply to Colonel Knox, Lord Naas stated the substance of the report of the Commissioners appointed to inquire into the conduct of the Tyrone Magistrates. The CHANCELLOR of the EXCHEQUER then stated the course which the Government proposed to take with regard to the business of the session. A number of bills, including the Tenants' Improvements (Ireland) Bill and the Land Improvement and Leasing (Ireland) Bill, would be withdrawn. The orders for the bills included in the list, as given by the right hon. gentleman, were subsequently discharged. The Scotch Reform Bill was read a second time without a word of comment, a circumstance which excited to considerable laughter. The Royal Parks Bill was read a second time, without a division, however, in which the numbers were—For the second reading, 181; against 64. The remaining business was then disposed of, and the House adjourned.

**SUSPECTED MURDER AT DERBY.**

On Friday considerable excitement was occasioned in the neighbourhood of the Derby Railway Station by the death of an elderly lady, widow of the late Mr. Cottitt, solicitor, of Derby, under circumstances which led to the conviction that a cruel and most blood-thirsty murder had been perpetrated. The unfortunate deceased, who resided in a terrace of houses opposite the railway station, was left in the house one on Thursday afternoon. Between four and five of the same afternoon a female friend arrived at the house and knocked at the front door, but no one answering she proceeded to the back door, which she found open. She entered, when, to her horror, she found Mrs. Footitt lying upon the sofa in a state of unconsciousness, a large clot of blood being on the top of her head and more blood on the sofa. Mrs. Footitt remained unconscious during the whole of the night, and died about nine o'clock yesterday morning, never having been able to recognise any of her children or friends. The present conjecture is that some strolling vagabond had come to the rear of the house, and, noticing her lonely position, had espied some articles of silver which stood upon a sideboard, and sought by force to obtain them, but had met with some resistance from the deceased, when he dealt her the blow which resulted in her death. If such, however, is the fact, he must have been disturbed, and decamped without the booty, as nothing was missed. —Express.
