

Nov. 23.—This morning the Rev. Roman Catholic clergyman attending men, read to them the following message from the Marchioness of Queensberry, British communion some years ago. The letter was a cheque for £300, which he distributed at his discretion amongst the condemned men:—

FRIENDS,—It may be that these few words will give you some consolation to you on your departure from this world. I send you a faithful messenger some help for you, and children in their approaching end, and with the assurance that as long as I live I will be cared for to the utmost of my power. My friend, Donnell, the bearer of this for me, will give you my address and the address of the messenger. It will also be a comfort for you to know that we remember you in the prayers of God, where the daily remembrance of His glorious sacrifice on Cavalry for us is celebrated. We have daily mass for you so that it pleases the good God to be called to Himself on Saturday evening, and the blood of our Lord and our Friend, will be presented for you at eight o'clock on that day, that which cleanses from all sin. May your thoughts be Jesus. Rest on Him and be willing and all-powerful to save; on His sacrifice on that cross for you, and hear Him say, 'To-day thou shalt be with Me in Paradise.' Yet will we remember you constantly at the altar of God after us as well as those whom you leave in and may Jesus Christ, the Saviour of all, and give you His last blessing and an eternal continuance of it in
