A sad accident took place on yesterday morning to  
a porter named Young, only nineteen years of age.  
It appears that he was at work at a corn store in  
Roche's-street, in the trap at the top of the store,  
through which sacks of corn are hauled up from  
carts in the street, and in some way he fell through  
the trap on the ground, breaking one of his arms,  
the cap of one of the knees, and sustaining slight con-  
cussion of the brain. He was taken up in an insen-  
sible state, and removed to Barrington's Hospital,  
where his wounds were attended to by the resident  
surgeon, Doctor McMahon, and although the poor fel-  
low has sustained very serious injuries, it is believed  
that he will recover.

We learn that the body of a carter named  
Moloney, from the neighbourhood of Tulla, who has  
been missing for the past month, was found yesterday  
down a precipice, at the side of the road near  
Meelick. It is supposed the deceased at night when  
going home fell off the car down the precipice and  
was killed. The body was taken to Meelick police  
barrack to await an inquest.

### SAD RESULTS OF DRUNKENNESS.

We learn that a melancholy occurrence has taken  
place at Glensharold, in this county, resulting in the  
premature death of a fine young man named Mullins,  
the son of a very respectable farmer of independent  
means, under circumstances of a very deplorable na-  
ture. It appears that Mullins and his father  
went to Rathkeale on Sunday to attend mass, but  
after leaving chapel instead of proceeding  
home, it appears that they entered publichouses, and  
spent their time in drinking with others, for by the  
time they got to Glensharold, both were in a very  
helpless state of exhaustion arising from the quantity  
of drink they took. They became so bad that a  
doctor had to be called in who felt it necessary at  
once to apply a stomach pump to both father and  
son, the former of whom was restored to conscious-  
ness, but the pumping had not the desired effect on  
the son, as he died very soon after. It is greatly to be  
regretted that country people, when they go to town  
on Sundays or on days of business, spend so much of  
their time as they do generally drinking in public houses.  
On the same evening that the death of young Mul-  
lins took place at Glensharold, we also regret to learn  
that the schoolmaster of the district was found lying  
dead in a ditch by the roadside; but how he died,  
or from what cause we have not been informed. The  
deceased, whose name was Whelan, has left a wife  
and large family to deplore his untimely fate.
