

Town Hall of the borough. The Mayor Mr. S. Bridgwood, presided, and there were about 120 other shareholders present. The Mayor stated that the meeting had been called to consider the following offer made by Mr Joseph Hulse, colliery proprietor, and earthenware manufacturer:—"I undertake to arrange, defend, or prosecute all suits, actions at law or other proceedings, now commenced or to be brought against this estate at my own cost, to pay all costs and charges incurred in the proceedings up to the present time, and to pay a dividend of 5s in the pound to all unsecured creditors, the said dividend to be paid seven days after the necessary arrangements of the Bankruptcy Court have been made, and to enable me to do this I take the whole of the bankrupt's estate, real and personal, whether in possession, reversion, remainder, expectancy, or otherwise." In the course of a discussion which took place on this proposition, it was stated that the sum due to unsecured creditors was about £90,000 and that the assets were estimated at from £24,000 to £27,000. The meeting unanimously accepted Mr Hulse's offer.

About 20,000 operatives are out on strike at Stockport, against a proposed abatement of 10 and 12 per cent in their wages. On Monday the Mills were thrown open to such of the workpeople as chose to return upon the proposed terms, and the offer was generally declined. The gates were watched, and few of the supposed "black sheep" presented themselves. Some mills which do not belong to Members of the Masters Association are at work; and one firm in the association, having effected a compromise, have not closed their works.

The *Courier of Wilna* of Feb. 21 contains the following circular, addressed to the provincial governors by the Governor General of the Western Provinces:—"It has come to my knowledge that a report has been spread amongst the Polish landed proprietors of the provinces placed under my authority that changes are to be made in the imperial ukases of the 4th and 12th January, 1866, under which the sequestrated lands and the lands of persons deported must be sold to persons of Russian origin, within a period of two years, dating from the 22nd of December, 1865. In order to remove this unfounded report, I recommend you, the provincial governor, to have published in the official journal of your province a notification that the above-mentioned imperial ukases will be executed without mitigation or modification, and that all the lands which are intended for compulsory sale if not sold before the 22nd of December in the present year will be put up to auction without delay.—BARANOFF, Wilna, Feb. 19, 1867."
