King George of Greece has gone to Cephalonia to
 visit the scene of the recent earthquake. The
 intelligence received here states that several towns and
 villages of that island were in ruins.
 The other morning 150 rounds of ammunition were
 discovered by the county police in what are known as
 the Hookersbrook Pits, just out of Chester, on the
 road to Warrington. This is the largest discovery of
 Fenian ammunition which has been made, although
 cartridges continue to be picked up in all directions
 by the roadsides leading from the city.
