**THE LUXEMBURG QUESTION.**

BERLIN, MAY 3.—Upon receiving the invitation to the Conference yesterday, Count Bismark stated that the King's Government was willing to accede to the neutralization of Luxemburg as the basis of negotiation. He added, however, that Prussia had no intention of excluding Luxemburg from the Zollverein, if neutralised, the latter question not being without the scope of the Conference.

The *Pall-Mall Gazette* says:—It is rumoured that it will be arranged at the London Conference that Belgium shall buy Luxemburg for ten millions of francs.

BERLIN, MAY 2 (EVENING)—The *North German Gazette* of this evening, in reference to a discussion which has appeared in the *Correspondence de Berlin* as to whether it was not desirable for the Conference to lay down the basis of a new European settlement, says it is not the intention, nor is it the interest of Prussia to extend the sphere of the negotiations at the Conference, whose only aim is to arrive at a peaceful solution of the Luxemburg question.
