On Tuesday, at Manchester, as already the trial of William Pherson Thompson Mullady, who were charged with being the murder of Sergeant Brett, terminated guilty, and they were condemned to murder of the unfortunate sergeant under circumstances quite familiar and shot in the prison van while defending of Kelly and Deasy, two noted Fen on their way to the city gaol. The evidence Thompson was very singular. He was in Hyde Park on the day of the attack but on the day before bought some Birmingham, two of them being found where the affray occurred. When Thompson apprehended he had in his possession 45 cartridges. With regard to Mullady the evidence was largely corroborative. He was apprehended in consequence of his having told a falsehood as they were going to a concert together that he was one of those who took part in the attack on Kelly and Deasy, that when in Manchester worked at Mr. Carr's, coach builder, a same evening of the attack on the van got away and changed his clothes, and painters' club-room. A large number were examined, and Thompson was proved as the purchaser of the revolver found at the scene of the affray.
