THE NEW ASYLUM GAS WORKS.
On Wednesday the trial of the extensive gas works, in connection with the Lunatic Asylum of this town, took place, in presence of Mr. Adair, the late County Surveyor, and Dr. Daxon, the Medical Superintendent of the Institution; Mr. Fitzgerald, Clerk of Works, and Mr. E. Meade, of the firm of Mr. M. Meade, Dublin, and a competent engineer from Mr. Daniel's gas-fitting establishment, Dublin. The gas-fittings, pipes, and other apparatus were found to work in excellent order, and the water-tank proved its capabilities to be fully adequate to its requirements. The result was perfectly satisfactory, and we believe Mr. Adair expressed his approval of the works and their adaptation to the required purposes. There was a large number of persons present from the town and neighbourhood, who had been attracted in order to witness the experiment and observe the effect of the illumination.

ENNIS BOARD OF GUARDIANS.
On this day the first meeting of the new Board took place. The chair was occupied severally by Thomas Greene, Esq., J.P., and Capt Augustine Butler, D.L. The other members of the Board present were—Pierce O'Brien, J.P.; Michael Kerin, J.P.; John Leary, Marcus Talbot, Henry Faircloth, John Cullinan, John M'Mahon, Wm. Halpin, Thomas Cullinan, James M'Namara, Daniel O'Keeffe, Patrick Power, and Daniel O'Brien.

After the minutes had been read and affirmed, Mr. Talbot said that he felt much pleasure in proposing that their former chairman, Captain Butler; vice-chairman, Major M'Donnell; and deputy-vice-chairman, Mr. Thomas Greene, be again elected to discharge the duties of the positions which they had so worthily filled during previous years, and with so much advantage to the interests of the Board (hear, hear).

Mr. Thomas Cullinan seconded the proposition, which passed unanimously.
Mr. Greene, on assuming the chair, said that he thanked the Board for the honour they had conferred on him in his absence, and hoped that he would always, by their co-operation, discharge the duties of the office of deputy-vice-chairman with advantage to the rate-payers (hear, hear).

The Clerk then read the following estimate of a new rate:—

Mr. Greene proposed and Mr. Talbot seconded that 4d be taken off Ennis and 1d off each of the other electoral divisions.

Mr. Halpin opposed the motion, and desired the estimate to be adopted; but Mr. Greene's motion was finally carried, with only three dissentients. The Board shortly after adjourned.

TULLA AND ENNISTYMON UNIONS.
At the meeting held in Tulla on Monday, the former chairman, Captain Charles George O'Callaghan, D.L., was elected chairman; Major Molony vice-chairman, and Thomas Corbett, Esq., deputy-vice-chairman for the ensuing year.

At Ennistymon, on yesterday (Tuesday), Colonel M'Namara was again elected as chairman; James O'Brien, Esq., D.L., vice chairman; and Thomas Lucas, Esq., J.P., deputy-vice-chairman.

The elections in each case were unanimous.

INQUEST.
On Saturday an inquest was held at Ballyvaughan by John Cullinan, Esq., on the bodies of two men named Callaghan and Cummin, who were accidentally drowned on the previous day whilst engaged in cutting sea-weed in an island in the bay. A small boat upset in which they were returning to the hooker in waiting for them. Two men who could swim escaped.
