ecting the other boys with fever, and he said to her that she should get some other place for him for a few days; Mrs. Ryan lived opposite, and she said she was willing to take him; he remained with her for three or four days, and after that he admitted him into the school; that was in the beginning of October; the alleged offence was stated in the summons to have taken taken place on the 23rd of December, but the boy left the school about the middle of January; could ascertain the time by the roll; inspected the school three or four times every week; ascertained the number present, and examined the roll; the roll produced is the original, correct, and only will for that period; finds by the roll that the complainant left the school on the 13th of January; visited and inspected the school three or four times a weeks between the 23rd of December and the 13th of January; Ryan was in the school during that time, and he never made any complaint to witness except about one of the boys, who he said hit him on the head, and witness went down to the school and ordered that kind of treatment not to be permitted; he never complained about Mr. Geale, Brookes, or any other of the boys; the week preceding Christmas they were providing for the Christmas dinners to the poor, and Mr. Geale was with him in the Orphan Hall each day from 12 to 5 p.m.; he was with him there on the 23rd of December in distributing food to the poor for Christmas; he was with him till evening on that day, which was Monday.

The boy Malone having been sent for, was examined by Mr. O'Donnell, but be correborated

the evidence given by the other boys.

The Magistrates retired, and after a legthened absence returned into court, when the Mayor said they considered the case required further investigation, and the majority were for sending the case to Quarter Sessions, but admitting the accused to nominal bail.
