ENNIS UNION.

Ennis, Wednesday Evening.

On this day the ordinary meeting of the above board took place.

Marcus Talbot, Esq., C.T.C., presided.

There were present also—John Leary, Arthur Kelly, Daniel O'Brien, and Michael Butler.

The minutes were read and duly affirmed, and the Clerk announced the state of the house to be—Admitted during the week, 17; discharged 8; remaining on 29th, 394; average cost 2s 4½d; infirmary 2s 8d; fever hospital, 3s 11d.

Upon the Clerk reading the degrees of cream which averaged from eight to ten degrees.

After the admission of paupers, and the performance of routine business, the Board adjourned.

ENNIS BOROUGH ELECTION.

The O'Gorman Mahon has written to several of his former supporters in town, stating his intention of standing for the borough in the event of being called on by the constituency. It is, however, improbable that many influential persons will encourage the candidature of the former representative of Ennis, as the honourable gentleman appears to many to be amongst the politicians of the past generation. There is no doubt, however, but that the O'Gorman Mahon has even still many adherents amongst the trades and working classes of the borough.

ANOTHER CASE OF STABBING.

A young man, a draper, in the employment of one of the large houses of this town, was stabbed a few evenings ago in two parts of the body, whilst engaged in a row with some other young men. The wounds do not, however, happen to be severe, and the party is progressing favourably in the infirmary. The names of the assailants are not as yet known, or if they are, there is an unwillingness to prosecute manifested up to the present.
