The undermentioned officers at Aldershot have been granted leave of absence on private affairs, as follows:—Capt Thompson, District Inspector of Musketry, from the 1st to the 15th of December, 1868; Capt T P Smith, Royal Horse Artillery, from the 28th of November to the 12th of December, 1868.

A court of inquiry assembled at Aldershot, on Tuesday, at the Laundry, West Cavalry Barracks, to investigate and report upon the cause of a fire which occurred there on the 23rd inst.

A draft of the 84th Regiment, consisting of Lieut Hamilton, one sergeant, two drummers, and 100 rank and file, is held in readiness to embark for Jamaica to join the service companies of the corps. Lieuts. Fenn, Pope, and Lonsdale, 49th Regiment, are under orders to proceed from the depot to the service companies.

It having been brought to the notice of the Secretary of State that cases have recently occurred in which filled shells have been found among empty shells returned into the charge of the Military State Department; also that filled cartridges, lucifer matches, and other dangerous substances have been mixed with empty cartridge cases delivered into stores, under clause 6, Army Circulars. 1867, Secretary Sir John Pakington has called attention to the very serious danger, both to life and property, arising from such acts of carelessness, and desires to impress upon all officers and others concerned the necessity for the exercise of the utmost care and vigilance, in order to prevent the introduction of any foreign substance whatever among the Laboratory stores returned to the military store depots or to the Royal Arsenal at Woolwich.

Intelligence has been received of the departure of Her Majesty's Indian troopship Malabar from Suez on the 1st instant for Bombay, with the 3d Hussars and drafts.

The Lizard, 2, 150-horse power, Lieut Commander S G Price, iron paddle wheel steamer, is in deck at Chatham, where she is undergoing a thorough overhaul and repair to both hull and machinery, after her term of service on the coast of Scotland, where she was employed in the protection of the fisheries.
