The Rapid, 5, screw (unarmoured wooden) sloop, 672 tons, 150-horse power, Commander Hon F L Wood, sailed from Portsmouth on Tuesday evening for the Mediterranean.

The Hererordshire Militia, under Lieutenant-Colonel Berington, was inspected on Friday last, at Hereford, by Sir Edward Campbell, the District Inspector of Reserve Forces, who at the conclusion of the inspection complimented the regiment on its efficiency on parade, and the general good conduct of the men in their billets. He expressed his satisfaction that out of 538 privates (the regiment being recruited up to its full quota) he saw 500 of them actually present in the ranks, and that only two or three men were absent unaccounted for. Forty-two of the men have volunteered for the Militia Reserve.
