The eruption of Mount Vesuvius is still imposing and threatening. All the cones emit formidable rumbling sounds, and eject large quantities of incandescent matter. The lava current is now 20 metres broad and from 10 to 12 metres deep. A whole chestnut forest has been set on fire by the lava near Foree Vetraua, and it has caused immense devastation. Many houses and farm lands have been overwhelmed, and the village of San Georgia is in imminent peril. The population of the neighbouring villages are leaving their homes, and great destitution prevails. It is proposed to open a subscription for their relief. All the authorities are at the spot, with a military division to protect property and assist in rescuing it from destruction.
