

is there stipulated that its members when called out for training shall be as follows:—Serjeant Major, 6d per diem; Serjeant, 3s; Corporal, 2s 6d; Private, 2s. A subsequent paragraph, however, declares that "when men of the 1st Class of the force all be attached to a Militia regiment for the purpose of training and exercise, the regulations as to pay and allowances applicable to that force will apply to members of the Reserve force while so attached.

The most noticeable feature in the organization of the force is the peculiar means to be employed for the preservation of discipline. Instead of the punishments in vogue in the regular forces, a series of fines are to be imposed on the men, the extent of which are to be carefully graduated according to the nature of the offence. Thus, for absence from parade for a quarter of an hour, a private is to be mulct of sixpence, and a sergeant of 1s. for the first offence, the penalty being twice as great on the second occasion; if the absence is prolonged to an hour, the fines are to be 2s and 3s; for a day, 3s 6d. and 5s 6d. Any man guilty of inattention or talking in the ranks after having been cautioned on the subject will be liable to a fine of sixpence for the first offence, two shillings for the third, and so on. Disrespect to superior officers will subject the delinquent to a fine of 20 shillings, &c. &c. It is by no means intended, however, if this punishment is found ineffectual that force shall be out of the place of the authorities to use more forcible means. All the members of the force are liable to the provisions of the Mutiny Act, and instructions are to be given as to the assembling of troops martial.

Circulars have been issued also respecting the Militia reserve, and at the recent inspections on the completion of the annual training, the inspecting officer has, in almost every case, drawn the attention of the men to the subject. The results at present, we believe, been null. The Militia do not take kindly to the notion; and so far as the regulars are concerned, we understand that no steps have been taken to bring the matter to the notice of the men. We doubt whether the regimental authorities will be very anxious to part with the elite of their men, and it is not unlikely, therefore, that for some time to come, at least the Army Reserve will be little better than a paper force—*U. S. Gazette.*

The Conard steamer Australasian, with American mails to the 20th ult, arrived at Queenstown on Thursday morning. The impeachment managers had introduced a resolution into the House of representatives alleging that information had been received that corrupt means having been used to influence the vote of the Senate on the charges against the President, and had obtained authority to institute an investigation.
