**WAKEFIELD CATTLE MARKET.**

There were a few fat calves, which fetched on an average about 6½d per lb. There was little demand for store cattle, and prices were low.

**SALISBURY MARKET.**

Owing to the recent hot weather the supply of dairy produce offered at this monthly market this morning was comparatively small, but of fair quality. There was a good attendance of buyers, and nearly the whole of the cheese pitched was cleared off, at an advance of from 3s to 4s per cwt on the prices current a month ago.
