The Cunard steamer Australasian, from New
York on 11th inst., arrived at Queenstown on Satur-
day. Despatches from San Francisco state that the
authorities at Victoria were apprehensive of a Fenian
raid, and were making great preparations to meet it.

The Colonelcy of the 54th Regiment, vacant by the
death of General Millmay Fane, in all likelihood
will be given to Major-General Studholme Hodgson,
now commanding the troops in Ceylon, an officer
whose long service and position on the list justifies
the selection.

Her Majesty has conferred upon Staff Commander
Alfred Balliston, of the Royal Yacht Elin, the ap-
pointment of Sergeant-at-Arms in the Lord Chamber-
lain's department.

The wardroom officers of her Majesty's ship Vic-
tory gave, on Friday last, a farewell dinner to the

the ship (his time having expired), as a token of the
esteem and regard in which he was held by his mes-
mates, and all on board; after which he was pulled
on shore by the junior officers,—at their request to
be allowed to do so,—who had been under his instruc-
tion.

In consequence of the great influx of troops ex-

Brown, 55th Regiment, to be Lieutenant-Col.; and
Captain Robert Law, Staff officer of Pensioners at
Plymouth, to be major in the Army.

Col. Erskine, C.B., only remains at his post in the
