of whom they endeavoured to secure. Mackay, who was armed with a revolver, made a desperate resistance. He fired, and succeeded in wounding one of the constables, but did not succeed in making good his escape. One of his three companions, however, got off in the melee. The struggle between the police and the prisoners is described as having been of the most desperate character. Ultimately the police were reinfored, when they succeeded in removing the prisoners to bridewell. A large crowed assem-bled, and great excitement prevailed. The police charged with their bayonets and wounded one man.
