He fired, and succeeded in wounding one of the constables, but did not succeed in making good his escape. One of his three companions, however, got off in the *melee*. The struggle between the police and the prisoners is described as having been of the most desperate character. Ultimately the police were reinforced, when they succeeded in removing the prisoners to bridewell. A large crowd assembled, and great excitement prevailed. The police charged with their bayonets and wounded one man.

**A ROYAL CARDINAL.**

A letter from Rome states that Prince Lucien Bonaparte is to receive the cardinal's hat in that city, and that the Emperor desires that the ceremonial observed when that dignity is conferred on Princes should be adhered to on this occasion. In that case Prince Lucien would have to be created cardinal alone in a consistory *ad hoc*, in which no other could be appointed at the same time.

**FRANCE AND PRUSSIA.**

The King of Prussia, on the occasion of receiving letters accrediting the Ambassador of France to the Confederation of Northern Germany, replied to the wds addressed to him by M. Benedetti that he was happy to see in that proceeding a sure pledge of the good relations existing between the two Governments, and that he was pleased to call up the recollections of the kind reception given by the Emperor and Empress of the French in Paris.

**THE RUMOURS IN ITALY.**

The *Observatore Romano* contradicts the statement that the Pope had offered *Te Deum* for the victory of Mentana, and also the allegation that Francis II. had ceded together the agents of the dispossessed Italian princes with the view of taking common political action.
