As a Dissolution of Parliament is about to take place, I beg to solicit, for the third time, a renewal of the trust with which you have honoured me for the last nine years.

As there was no effort at legislation on the Land Question during the last Session, I endeavoured as an instalment of justice to the tenant, to pass a Bill providing for the payment of County cess by landlord and tenant on the same principle as Poor Rates. Though the Bill was defeated for the time, its justice was admitted, and I may fairly say it was only postponed for the purpose of more comprehensive legislation on the relations subsisting between the owners and occupiers of the soil.

As in the past I have made it a rule of my conduct in Parliament always to consult the wishes of my constituents, so in the future, as long as you honour me with your confidence, I shall act on this sound maxim, and to the best of my ability prove myself the faithful representative of your opinions and feelings.
