case against the father, as he was only present at the time of the occurrence, and as the son bore a good character he would accept his plea of guilty and consent to a nominal punishment. The Court, as the prisoner Daniel Blake had been in custody since August, only sentenced him to a month and hard labour. Five men named Barry, Mullins, Ryan, Talty, and P Barry were found guilty of a riot in Mill-street, Ennis, on the fair-day, 3rd December last, and sentenced to one month and £2 fine each. John Greene, aged 68 years, for stabbing Denis Murphy on the 30th May last at Killealy, near Ennis, was prosecuted by Mr Coffey, Q C, and Mr Waters, and defended by Mr Perry. Murphy deposed that he had been wounded in three parts of the body, and that the wound on his belly had caused his intestines to protrude largely. He had merely, he alleged, a dispute of words with Greene before the occurrence, on their way home from town. Dr William Stamer proved the serious character of the wounds, and that the life of the prosecutor had been in the most imminent danger. His Lordship, in passing sentence, said that nothing but almost a miracle could have saved the man's life—most probably it was owing to the skill of the respectable doctor who had attended him that his life had been spared; but if the prisoner had been given in charge for the first count in the indictment he would be sentenced to five years' penal servitude; but although he had been only arraigned for a misdemeanour by the finding of the Grand Jury, yet he should be imprisoned for 18 months. Patrick Hynes was arraigned for stabbing one Timothy Fitzgerald during a scuffle on their return home from the fair of Corofin on the 23rd November last. Dr M'Namara, of Corofin, deposed that he had attended the prosecutor, who had received three slight wounds, as if by a knife, in the back. The prisoner was found guilty, and sentenced to six months, with hard labour. James Kelly, charged with the homicide of a woman named Mescal at Ballynacally last month, was proved by Dr William Cullinan to be a maniac and of unsound mind. The manner of the homicide also exhibited complete insanity, as the poor woman was met on the road by the prisoner, whilst in a state of fierce excitement, and some straw which lay about thrust into her mouth. The jury found that the prisoner was of unsound mind, and he was accordingly ordered by the Court to be kept in Dundrum Asylum during her Majesty's pleasure. The court adjourned at six o'clock. THIS DAY (FRIDAY). On this morning the court opened at nine o'clock. The only case before Judge Keogh in the Crown Court was that of P Lysaght against Austin Mackeen and Thomas Cullinan for firing at him in January last. The evidence not being conclusive, his Lordship directed the jury to acquit the prisoners immediately. This concluded the criminal business of the assizes, and his Lordship left court at 11 o'clock. RECORD COURT. The Hon Justice O'Brien was occupied on yesterday and this day disposing of appeals. The appeal of the Ennis Guardians to a decree obtained by D Glynn, milk contractor, for a sum of £29 8s 9d, being the amount stopped for milk below the required number of degrees shown by the lactometer, was confirmed up to the 22nd July last, but it having been proved that the contractors since that period up to September were appraised each day of the deficiencies in degrees by the present Master, his Lordship deducted from the amount stated a sum of £3 12s 10d for the period between July and September. By this decision it appears that the Board is upheld, and that the Guardians have the power of making the deductions under the bonds entered into by contractors. The only record which came before the court was Mrs Mallin, of Limerick, v. Mrs Mary Hunt, of Kiltrush, for possession of a house in that town. The case was settled by consent, the plaintiff undertaking to give another house to the defendant in lieu of the one required to be surrendered.
