covery with respect to the necessity of a uniform temperature, in order to facilitate the proper development of the properties of cream in the milk supplied to the workhouse.

The Chairman said that he considered the Board had on the former day of meeting acted prematurely by ordering payment for milk which had been found on delivery to be under the specified standard.

It was then agreed to enforce the terms of the bond of milk contractors, and that the usual weekly report of the degrees of cream be read for the Board as formerly, and that the contractors be informed of the Board's resolution.

Major MacDonnell said, with respect to the return requested by the Medical Officer of the foundlings in the house, all of whom he stated to have died, that Dr Cullinan considered the returns were not such as he required, as children had been included in it over six months when admitted.

A number of deserted and foundling children were then brought before the Board, of whom five turned out to be under six months, and one seven months.

Mr Cullinan said that they were a favourable specimen of the class of children referred to by Dr Cullinan.

Major MacDonnell—Seeing is believing. These children appear to be in good health—none of them are decrepid or otherwise afflicted in that respect.

A letter was read from the Commissioners, enclosing a report of the National School Inspector, with respect to the condition of the schools and the progress of the pupils. The report testified most favorably for the competency and attention of the teachers and the improvement of the children.

During the admission of paupers, a woman named Lee claimed admission, in consequence of having been turned out of doors by her son, who had four milk cows, and was tenant of Dr Turner's, of Tuam, county Galway.

The Chairman expressed his horror of the circumstance, and the Board directed that their solicitor be requested to take proceedings against the son for her support.

The Board then adjourned.

TULLA BOARD OF GUARDIANS.

On Monday the ordinary weekly Board met. Captain Charles George O'Callaghan, D L, occupied the chair. There were also present—Major W M Molony, Marcus Molony, J P; F M Westropp, J P, &c.

The question of the milk, with regard to degrees of cream, was discussed, and reference made to the discovery alleged to have been mentioned before the Ennis Board by their Medical Officer, Dr P M Cullinan, to the effect that the same milk produced 8 degrees of cream in 60 degrees of temperature, and 12 degrees in a temperature of 42.

The Master informed the Board that their standard was 9 degrees of cream, and that at one time he had known milk to produce 18 degrees of cream, whilst next day, when well mixed up, the same milk only registered six degrees.

After the disposal of contracts, the Board adjourned.

The House of Commons committee have reported against the contracts with the Cunard and Inman lines of American steamers, but it is understood that on each division the committee divided 3 and 3, the chairman having a casting vote, and giving it always against the contract. The report cannot, however, be before the house for a week, and the loss of time will, in effect, give solidity to the contract. The report will therefore go for nothing save as an expression of opinion of the committee.
