

LONDON PROVISION MARKET.

(From Jones Brothers' Circular).

Bacon—Imports of singed sides from Ireland 2,593, and from Hamburg 2,647 bales. Arrived to-day and on the way from Ireland about 1,945 bales. With very dull enquiry for Irish singed last week prices rather declined 2s per cwt. and the market closed on Saturday without life at our quotations. Arrivals from the Continent were large, but no change in prices occurred, 73s and 75s landed being paid for Hamburg sizeable and light weights. In Irish sale middles nothing doing.

Arrivals from America into Liverpool were 1,433 boxes against 312 in the corresponding week last year. American singed sides continue saleable at 66s and 70s, short rib-in middles are now held for 64s and 66s, and Cumberland cut at 62s but sales are few. Long out hams in salt are offered at 64s and 68s without attracting any attention.

Butter—Imports of Irish 799 firkins. Arrived to-day from Ireland about 900 firkins. From the Continent by direct steamers 9,489 casks are reported against 8,648 last year; from France via Southampton and Railway 13,967 packages against 17,367 last year, none from America. Some further sales of fine Clonmel were reported last week at 104s f o b and 1st and 3rd Corks at our quotations, but demand continues trifling for Irish of any sort as supplies of English make and Foreign are sufficient for all wants. To-day Friesland sells freely at 104s to 106s, Zwolle and Kampen 100s to 104s, Danish and Kiel none, Bosch 80s to 84s, Leer 88s to 91s, Jersey 80s to 96s Normandy 90s, 100s to 103s, and Morlaix 76s to 80s.

LONDON PRODUCE MARKET.

Sugar—Full rates asked; good business in landed parcels; fair demand for cargoes afloat, and prices fall up. Refined not much in request, still rates firm, and supply light. **Coffee**—Fair business at previous worth for all sorts. Tea not much wanted; at the same time full terms required. **Rice**—Full transactions in floating cargoes, at previous worth; little passing on spot, but prices steady.

First Quality—Beef, 3s 6d to 6s 0d; mutton, 3s 4d to 5s 8d; veal, 3s 6d to 5s 8d; pork, 3s 8s to 5s 6d; lamb, 4s to 6s 0d., at per stone of 8lb, sinking the offal.

Beef firm; supply of English continuing short; full rates demanded and given. Foreign trade firm. Mutton receded. English and foreign, 2d to 4d. Veal stationary. Pigs looking up.

Market buoyant, owing to light supplies and unfavourable weather. English white wheat, 8s to 4s dearer than on Monday last. Red wheat, 2s, and foreign, 2s higher.

Weather very unsettled. English wheat in small supply, and 2s to 3s dearer. Foreign—Sellers, at 2s to 3s more money. Floating cargoes—A few fresh arrivals, which are held for 2s to 3s advance. Maize in good request, at 28s to 40s for fresh arrivals. Danube flour 1s to 2s per sack dearer. Indian corn sells at 29s per 480lbs. Barley nearly 1s dearer. Peas and beans the turn dearer. Oats 6d dearer, with good consumptive demand.

LIVERPOOL CATTLE MARKET.
