Bacon—Imports of singed sides from Ireland 3,034, and from Hamburg 1,233 bales. Arrived to-day and on the way from Ireland 1,750 bales. Demand was moderate for Irish singed lass week at an advance of 1s to 2s per cwt, at the close '80s for b was charged for favorite Waterford sizeable shipped in fulfillment of weekly orders. Hamburg cure was in steady request at 70s, 73s, to 75s landed for sizeable and light weights. For Irish bale middles there is no enquiry.

Arrived from America into London and Liverpool were 3,376 boxes against 6,681 in the corresponding week last year. American singed sides clear on landing at 62s to 66s. Short rib in middles are in moderate request at 61s to 63s, Cumberland cut dull at 58s to 60s. Leng cut hams in dry salt fetch 64s to 66s, with few remaining.

Beef—There was no enquiry last week and with accumulating stocks of middling and inferior qualities prices must be quoted 5s to 15s per tierce lower for such descriptions.

Butter—Imports of Irish 179 firkins. Arrived to-day and on the way from Cork about 30 firkins. From the Continent by direct steamers 3,963 casks were reported against 5,476 last year; from France via Southampton and Railway 15,727 packages against 10,824 and from America into Liverpool 195 against 60 last year. Best Friesland sells slowly at 132s to 136s, Zwolle and Kampen 116s, 120s to 130s, Danish and Kiel 80s, 128s to 142s.

Michael English was then indicted for a grievous assault on Thomas Bourke, at Roheroe, on the 18th December, 1868, and pleaded not guilty. The indictment contained four counts.

The Crown was represented by the same Counsel as in the former case.

Mr O'Loughlin, B.L., defended the prisoner. The evidence in this case turned entirely upon a question of sufficiency of identification the allegation for the defence being that the principal witness against the defendant was so drunk at the time of the occurrence that he did not know what he asserted to have seen.

The case was a short one, and was rather of an unimportant nature, but the jury had not returned their verdict up to the closing of this report.

I have only to add, we all returned home at one o'clock, more than pleased with the morning's work, and only hope early hours will be the order of the day.
