PRESENTATION OF PLATE TO WAINRIGHT CROWE, ESQ., J.P.

On yesterday (Tuesday) a magnificent service of plate, consisting of a candelabra, and two flower dishes at either side, of massive proportions and exquisite workmanship, together with two claret jugs of moorish pattern, was presented by Capt. Augustine Butler, DL, on the part of subscribers, to Wainright Crowe, Esq. J.P., the popular agent of Lord Leonfield. There was also a magnificent diamond bracelet presented to Mrs Crowe. The object of the testimonial was to indicate the respect and esteem entertained for Mr Crowe, both in his capacity as landlord and agent, and to commemorate the event of his having procured from a generous nobleman, now no more, the late Lord Leonfield, the site of a magnificent fair-green for the inhabitants of Ennis and the people of Clare generally, which is being fitted up in a style of grandeur quite in character with the noble donor. The rich present cost over £400, and the subscribers represented all classes and creeds, but chiefly the people of Clare. Captain Butler and the members of the committee who accompanied him were entertained to a splendid luncheon. The proceedings were merely of a private character, owing to the recent demise of the noble lord, whose memory may be said to be honourably and worthily commemorated by the event.

Some months since, says the *Chronicle*, it was brought officially to the knowledge of the Clonmel Board of Guardians that two of the applicants for situations as school-teachers, had been summarily dismissed by clerical Patrons—though persons of great efficiency and unquestionably moral character—from the positions they had held under the National Board, simply because of their having attended the Model National Training Establishment in Dublin for the purpose of being "classified," thus giving offence to the Roman Catholic Hierarchy. Here this circumstance was not permitted to bar their eligibility. One of the "proscribed" was unanimously elected. At the last meeting of the Westport Board of Guardians a similar occurrence was brought to light; but a Roman Catholic clergyman having appeared before the board, and stated that the teacher applying for the mastership of the workhouse schools had evoked the displeasure of the priests by opposing their wishes in continuing under the National Board, a majority of the guardians, yielding to this dictation, refused to vote for his appointment, though his testimonials were unexceptionable, and that there was no other candidate in the field. Lord John Browne, the chairman, declared it an extraordinary procedure to reject a young man so well qualified to fill the office merely because he had visited a training school. The rev. gentleman who attended said that had the applicant gone to the proper quarter—in other words, if he had made peace with ecclesiastical authority—"all would have been right."
