THE CUBAN INSURRECTION-REPORTED

BATTLE AT LOS MINAS.
The following is from Havannah, dated the 12th of

May:—
"Private letters have been received from rebel sources, giving accounts of another battle between the Spanish troops and the insurgents. It took place on the 3rd instant, at Los Minas. The Spaniards numbered 1,200, and were under the command of General Lesca. The revolutionary force was commanded by General Quesada in person. One report says that before the fight commenced Quesada posted the native Cubans in front, protected by intrenchments, and placed a force of 400 Dominican and American vo-lunteers in their rear with orders to fire upon them if Thus placed between two fires, the Cubans they ran. fought with desperation. The Spaniards attacked the intrenchments three times with the bayonet. The two first assaults were repulsed by the Cu-The two first assaults were repulsed by the Cubans, the third was determined and severe, and the Cubans began to waver, when Quesada ordered the rear guard to the front. They advanced, driving the Cubans into the front rank of the enemy. A hand-to-hand combat ensued, in which the butchery was horrible. The Spaniards finally gave way and retreated, but in good order. Their loss is estimated at 160 killed and 300 wounded. That of the Cubans 200 killed and a proportionate number of the Cubans 200 killed and a proportionate number wounded. The forces of Quesada, after fight, marched to San Miguel and burned the town in sight of the retreat of the Spaniards. It is generally believed that the revolutionary leaders have changed their policy in the field, and in future will fight instead of retreating to the mountains on the appearance of any considerable force of Government troops. In the battle at Altagracia, which took place on the 1st inst, the Cuban loss was 200, and the Spanish killed and wounded 180. The Spaniards here regard the result of these actions as fatal to the cause of the rebellion, but the Cubans are jubilant over them as the first great successes of the war of independence.
