Next to this is a property of which the landlord has been a constant absentee, spending all the money drawn out of Ireland. The land has been let at rack rents, nothing has been allowed for buildings or improvements, no allowances given for the potato or cattle disease, and the rents regularly raised as much as was possible. Now, I ask, could any one law apply to both of these cases without the most extreme injustice, or should this right, from which the landlord is to be deposed, to be given alike to the drunken, idle, careless, ignorant tenant as to the sober, industrious, intelligent one: to the one who has been one year, or himself and his family over one hundred on the land?

CITY POLICE COURT—THIS DAY.

Before Alderman O'Callaghan.

Thomas Burns, a carpenter, was brought up in custody of Constable Woods, charged with the perpetration of a violent and unprovoked assault on a Mrs Lawler in Sheehy's-lane, Irishtown, at ten o'clock last night. From the evidence it appeared that some verbal dispute took place between prosecutrix and prisoner when the latter raised a large saw he held in his hand, with which he took nearly the entire scalp of the back of the woman's head off. She was removed to Barrington's Hospital where the wound was dressed by Dr Carey, who pronounced it a dangerous one from which erysipilas might ensue. The prisoner alleged he was called an offensive name and received a blow of a large stone on the head from Mr Lawler before he attempted to saw her head off, but her daughter who witnessed the assault swore that no provocation had been given on her part.

Alderman O'Callaghan remanded the prisoner till next week, in consequence of the doctor's statement to the Constable.

A Lay Diocesan Conference for the diocese of Clonfert and Kilmacduagh was held yesterday, at Ballinasloe. The conference was opened by the Lord Bishop of Killaloe, who, after a brief address explanatory of the object of the meeting, retired from the chair, and Lord Clancarty was called on to preside. In reply to a question, the Bishop of Killaloe stated that, as the clergy would contribute as largely, in proportion to their means, as the laity, they should for the present, at least, have a voice in matters of finance. As regards questions of doctrine, he could not see how these would arise; they were not about to alter their articles of faith, and, till such was the case, the very nice point raised by the question would not present itself for solution.
