Now, I a-k, could any one law apply to both of these cases without the most extreme injustice, or should this right, from which the landlord is to be deposed, to be given alike to the drunken, idle, careless, ignorant tenant as to the sober, industrious, intelligent one; to the one who has been one year, or himself and his family over one hundred on the land ?

CITY POLICE COURT-THIS DAY.

Before Alderman O'Callaghan. Thomas Burns, a carpenter, was brought up in custody of Constable Woods, charged with the perpetration of a violent and unprovoked assault on a Mrs Lawler in Sheehy's-lane, Irishtown, at ten o'clock last night. The prisoner alleged he was called an offensive name and received a blow of a large stone on the head from Mr Lawler before he attempted to saw her head off, but her daughter who witnessed the assault swore that no provocation had been given on her part.

Alderman O'Callaghan remanded the prisoner till next week, in consequence of the doctor's statement to the Constable.
