Three men named Lyons and Sullivan were charged with cutting young ash saplings in a plantation belonging to the Earl of Devon, near the town. A very intelligent boy named Connell proved clearly to the fact of one of the persons charged having entered the wood in question and cut young ash, hazle, &c. which he said were wanting for scollops—a most wanton and malicious act. The case was not fully proved against the other two, and they were discharged; and in John Lyons case a fine of 1s, with 1d compensation, and cost of Court was imposed. Mr Curling, who as agent for Lord Devon, retired from the Bench during the adjudication, remarked that the Act of Parliament gave power to the magistrates in such cases as the present to commit to jail for two months, or to pay a fine of £5 and compensation.

Denis Reidy charged Pat Tully with absenting himself from his service as apprentice to the shoemaking trade. This young chap was only a month apprenticed and misconducted himself very much. He is son to a beggarwoman, and being brought up in idleness could not lay his mind to work. He got a caution to return to his service, and the case was adjourned for a week.

Several drunkards were fined in nominal penalties, and the case adjourned.

THE LATE HIGH WINDS.

The fearful storm of rain and hail that has continued here during the past week has put a complete stop to all kinds of outside work. The low lands particularly are covered with water, and much distress is being felt by the labouring poor.

MOVEMENT OF TROOPS.

It is expected that a detachment of troops will shortly be quartered in the military barracks near Cappa, half a mile distant from town, as the local conservators of the peace appear apprehensive of their absence being inconvenient should the "national" breeze continue to increase in its effect. At all events, their presence will have the effect of increasing trade and otherwise enlivening this dull season of the year.

A telegram has been received from Malta, stating that Her Majesty's Indian troopship Crocodile was to leave that port for Portsmouth at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, having on board 37 officers, 13 ladies, 17 children, 11 staff sergeants, 9 wives of ditto, 14 children of ditto, 736 men, 78 women, and 145 children.

We, (Herald) understand that the "Minna," of the Cork steamship company, on its arrival on Wednesday morning from London, was very closely searched by the police—every part of the vessel and passengers being strictly examined. It is said that the police received informations from London, that a quantity of arms were being conveyed to Cork, by her, and then suspicions were greatly increased by the long delay in the steamers arrival, it being due on the previous Sunday morning. It was delayed in consequence of strong gales in the channel. After a most rigorous search, the police departed without having found anything.

The following is an extract from a soldier belonging to one of the flying columns of military just arrived in Ireland, received by his friends in London, on Thursday morning:—"Dear Relatives—Do not expect me home for a Christmas holiday, as I was promised, nor write, nor send newspapers to me, for our seven divisions of flying columns—about 28,000 men—are always in a state of uncertainty. We are scampering about in all directions, and it is quite a treat to turn into our blankets."
