

the occasion of the distribution of prizes at the Horticultural Exhibition. In answer to a congratulatory address of the Mayor of Chartres, the Emperor said "20 years ago when I was appointed President of the Republic it was the town of Chartres which I visited first. I have not forgotten the pleasing reception I met with. It was within your walls I, on the strength of my good intentions, made my first appeal to the spirit of conciliation calling upon all good citizens to sacrifice for the public good their regrets and feelings of rancour. To-day after 17 years of peaceful prosperity I am about to speak to you in the same language, but with greater authority and confidence than in 1848. Once more I address myself to the honest men of every party, inviting them to second the regular advance of my government on the path of liberal progress which has laid down, and to oppose their insuperable resistance to the subversive passions which appear to revive only to threaten the unshaken fabrics of universal suffrage. In a few days the people will meet in their electoral committee, and will, I have no doubt, choose men worthy of that mission of civilization which we have to accomplish. I count upon you citizens of Chartres, because I know you are a part of those eight millions of Frenchmen who have thrice accorded me their suffrage, and because I know you are animated with ardent patriotism, and where genuine love of one's country reigns, there the best guarantees for order, progress, and literature cannot fail to exist."

### LONDON PROVISION MARKET.

(Jones Brothers' Circular.)

**Bacon**—Imports of singed sides from Ireland 3,118, and from Hamburg 1,979. Arrived and on the way from Ireland about 1,470 bales. With arrivals of over 5,000 bales of Irish and Hamburg, prices were 1s to 2s per cwt lower. No sales of Irish bale middles reported. Arrivals from America 1,314 boxes. American moves slowly at 64s to 65s for mild cured singed sides according to weights, 63s to 64s for short rib-in middles, and 60s to 61s for Cumberland cut, being a decline of 1s to 2s per cwt. Long cut hams in salt fetch 86s to 70s.

**Butter**—Imports of Irish 147 firkins. Arrived today from Cork 165 firkins. From the Continent by direct steamers 3,233 casks were reported against 10,760 last year; from France, 15,032 packages against 19,825 last year, none from America. Dealings in Irish continue limited to 3rd and 4th Corks. English make were larger and with arrivals of Foreign sufficient for all wants, fine qualities of Irish therefore are not enquired for. Friesland sells at 94s to 96s, Zwolle and Kampen 74s to 90s, Danish and Kiel 50s to 70s (New Milk Kiel 116s to 120s), Bosch 50s to 70s, Leer 70s to 76s, Jersey 80s, 90s to 98s, Normandy 80s, 90s, 104s to 112s, Morlaix 76s to 80s, and Spanish unsaleable.

 Fair supply of beef, but somewhat easier for buyers. Middling English breeds and foreign a reduction of 2d to 4d. Mutton lower.

### LIVERPOOL CATTLE MARKET.

The supply of cattle at to-day's market was much larger than on last Monday, and that of sheep about the same. Demand slow for cattle at last week's prices, except a very few prime cattle, which made extreme prices. Sheep sold very high. Beef, 7½d to 8½d per lb; sheep, 7½d to 9½d and 10½d per lb; lamb, 36s to 38s, and 44s each. 2,235 cattle, and 7,705 sheep at market.
