TURKEY AND GREECE.

Pera, January 5. The Levant Berald says the Porte has modified the order for the expuision of Greeks. The Hellenes are to remain, but former Ottomans who are now Greeks must resume their allegiance or leave.

THE CONFERENCE.

Paris Monday Evening.

The "Moniteur" says the programme of the Conference is so strictly limited to the five points of the Turkish ultimatum, that the Ottoman plenipotentiary has orders to retire immediately if any other subject shall be brought under discussion.

The "Debats" has the following:—"The journals officially asserted yesterday in the most positive manner that the initiative of the project for a Conference came from Berlin. The Russian journals continue to contribute the honour of that act to the Cabinet of St. Petersburg, They want to have the Muscovite empire always appear to the eyes of the Christian population of the East as the only power interested in their condition, or which undertakes useinterested in their condition, or which undertakes usefully and efficaciously to ameliorate. There is nothing very new in the proceedings. What is more important to notice is, that the Russian press is at this moment making the most gradious advances to France, against whom it was most bitter not long since. According to the "Moscow Gazatte" there will be seen at the conference at Paris on one side Russia, France, Prussia, and Italy, while England will be left alone with Austria to sustain the com-plaints of the Porte. The "Journal de St Petersburg" also tries to represent the French Government as more or less converted to the Prussian policy in the East. It founds its opinion, more especially, on what lately appeared in the "Etendard," and it will doubtless not fail to add that the articles in question bave so much the greater importance that a few days be fore they were published the Administration had given that journal a new mark of favour in designating it to receive the judicial advertisements of the department of the Seine. The Russian organ terminates by urging Turkey to withdraw her ultimatum in the interest of her own dignity. Doubts may be entertained as to whether the Porte will hasten to adopt that friendly advice.
