There was a marked advance in prices, best descriptions realized from 75s to 77s per cwt., and secondary and inferior qualities from 70s to 73s. Beef is getting somewhat scarce, and there is every prospect of these high prices being maintained. We had a much shorter supply of sheep than last week, and trade was rather dull; notwithstanding this prices had an upward tendency, and best wethers realized from 9d to 9½d per lb (in the wool); while in some few instances 9½d was obtained; ewes sold at from 8½d to 8¾d.
