In the cases of drunkenness he was fined 5s and costs, or 7 days imprisonment in default of payment, and in the assault case he was ordered to be imprisoned for three weeks with hard labour. On hearing his sentence he said it was very unjust, and that the next time he was charged with assault it would be for one month while, and continued so abusive that the Court ordered him up again, and added, that at the expiration of his term of imprisonment he should enter into bail to be of the peace for 12 months, or undergo a further imprisonment of 3 months.

Head Constable Buckley charged Thomas Murphy, a publican, with having his public house open for sale of spirits, &c., at 12 o'clock at night on Sunday, 3d inst., and persons therein drinking. No defence. Ordered to pay 10s and costs.

Jeremiah Foran summoned Pat Shea and three others for assault upon him, 2nd his son John Foran summoned two for the same offence. After a long investigation all the cases were dismissed on the merits.

Constable G. Forsyth brought up Thomas Magner, charged with assault upon Denis Keavin, and severely wounding him. Keavin appeared with marks of severe treatment on his head, and Dr. Ambrose proved the dangerous nature of the wounds. Keavin on being sworn said that he was drunk on the night in question and could not say who struck him; the Constable had three witnesses, all of whom said they were present at the time, but they did not remember, nor see any blows, and the case was dismissed.

Some short processes were disposed of and several drunkards fined in small penalties and the Court adjourned.

FATAL ACCIDENT.

A man named Crowley, returning from Kilkee last night with goods for shipment to Limerick, being very much under the influence of drink, fell off the car and was taken up dead. An inquest will be held to-day by the coroner.

BUTTER MARKET.

The Butter market continues to be well supplied—over 400 firkins were sold on Wednesday at high prices.

HIGH TIDES.

Though the tides observed here on Tuesday and Wednesday were somewhat higher than those of the usual high spring tides, there was nothing more remarkable connected with them. The Vandeleur steamer anchored off Scatterry island each night.

GRAIN MARKET.

Oats is coming into market in considerable quantities, the average price is 11½d per stone; potatoes, 4½d; fresh butter, 14d per lb; mutton, 6d to 7d; prime beef, 7d to 8d per lb; eggs, 8d per doz; straw, £2 10s per ton.

The predictions of the prophets regarding the tides have been generally falsified throughout England as well as in this country.

The Cashel Election Commissioners resumed their inquiry on Thursday. A Mr Kingsberry was recalled and at the close of his examination was informed by the court that they had been carefully considering whether they should not commit him for contempt of court, on account of the unsatisfactory way in which he had given his evidence. The witness pleaded that he was an old man, and his memory was bad. An other witness said he had heard that the "other side" were very liberal, but he did not believe the one half of what he heard in Cashel, and the other half he doubted. Another, who had heard that "£30 was the figure," said he thought that when he had voted honourably for Mr Munster, he would get a share of anything that was going.

The Cashel Election Commissioners resumed their inquiry on Wednesday morning. The evidence was chiefly in regard to orders given for drink. One letter claiming £98 for drink supplied was read in Court. One of the witnesses stated that while the election was pending it was scarcely possible to go into a house in Cashel without being canvassed. The Sligo inquiry was also resumed the same day. The witnesses whose names were called did not answer, and Mr Heron said the court should be adjourned for their attendance.
