THE ENNIS AND ATHENRY BAILWAY.

On yesterday the Waterford directors and those of the Athenry line again proceeded from Ennis to Athenry and back, with a view to arrangements for the opening of the line. On last evening the special train again returned, but it is alleged that no final conclusion has been arrived at, and the line will not be opened for traffic as soon as had been anticipated. It is, however, asserted that early next week another meeting of the directors and officials of both companies will take place, when it is supposed something final will be decided on. It has been believed that the Midland Company were negociating for the haulage of the line.

THE LATE MELANCHOLY CASE OF DROWNING.

On yesterday evening, at five o'clock, an inquest was held on the body of the young gentleman, Master Cummins, about seventeen years old, who had been accidentally drowned on Wednesday. After evidence had been heard relative to the circumstances already mentioned, the following verdict was arrived at by the jury empanelled by Mr John Cullinan, coroner, who had considerably delayed the inquest for the arrival of the friends of the deceased :- "We find that deceased was accidentally drowned while bathing in the River Fergus, near Clonroad bridge, in the town of Ennis, on Wednesday, the 18th day of August, 1869, and beg to tender our heartfelt sympathy to his afflicted parents on their very sad be-reavement; and that no blame whatsoever can be attributed to the Head Master, Rev Mr Barnes, as on enquiry we find that he has never given a pupil liberty to bathe, but on the contrary has given directions to the pupils not to bathe."

The mother of the deceased arrived here this morning by train, and it is ascertained that she resides near Elphin, in the county Roscommon. The exertions of Constable Birmingham, and the humanity exhibited by him throughout the entire of this melan choly affair, has been nost meritorous. The Rev Mr Barnes labours under deep affliction in consequence of so awful a calamity having occurred in his establishment. It appears that no liberty had been given for bathing, but the boys left the College for that purpose under pretence of going to town to make some necessary purchases.
