In two Industrial Schools, brought before the
magistrates at the Ballinacorney court, on Friday, in
which two girls were charged by a Roman Catholic
clergyman with being guilty of adultery, expressed the
opinion that the girls were to be sent to the work-
house. He added that the magistrates must set their
faces against the proposal of a petition for these
Industrial Schools. The benches were adjourned,
in order that the opinion of the Law Officers of the
Crown might be taken on certain matters connected
with the administration of the Act.

Lieutenant-Colonel Robert Royal (late Madras

Colonel Robertson Ross, Adjutant General of
Militia for the Dominion of Canada, has reported
favourably to the Privy Council of the Dominion
on the preparations made for emergencies at Gode-
rich, Toronto, and other points.

Lieutenant-General Sir George Buller, KCB, the
General Commanding in Chief the South West Mil-
itary District, on Saturday, at Portsmouth, inspected
the 23rd (Royal Welsh Fusiliers) Regiment of Infan-
try on Southsea common, on the return of the regiment
from India and previous to their embarkation on board
Her Majesty's screw troopship *Orontes* for convey-
ance to Devonport, where the regiment will for a
time be quartered. The regiment made a very
effective appearance.

The 42d Royal Highland (the "Black Watch")
Regiment arrived at Aldershot on Saturday after-
noon, and occupied quarters in G. H and M lines,
South Camp. The regiment left Edinburgh on Tues-
day, embarked on board the *Orontes* troopship and
sailed on Wednesday for Portsmouth, at which place
it disembarked on Friday, and on Saturday it pro-
ceeded to its destination. On the arrival of the regiment
in camp it formed open column of companies on the
square, and in that order was inspected by Major-
General D. Lysons, C.B., who was much pleased with
its appearance and condition.

It has been resolved to hold four divisional assem-
