Supply of beasts limited; demand brisk; prices firm, at an advance of 2d on last week, at these rates. British and foreign effecting a clearance. Good business in sheep, at enhanced rates; short supply; prices looking upwards. Veal cleared at advance. Pork unaltered.

LONDON PROVISION MARKET.

Bacon—Imports of signal sleyd from Ireland 2,188, and from Hamburg, 1,336 bales. Arrived to-day and on the way from Ireland about 1,300 bales. With a very dull demand Irish singled on the spot and for immediate shipment declined 2s to 4s per cwt, last week the market closing on Saturday with few buyers at this abatement. Arrivals from Hamburg being on an increased scale holders were free sellers at 70s, 71s to 73s landed for sizable and light weights. No enquiry for Irish bale middles.

Arrivals from America into London and Liverpool were 2 063 boxes against 1,267 in the corresponding week last year. No American singled sides unsold; the next arrivals will probably fetch 64s to 68s according to weights. Short rib-in-middles are in moderate request at 64s to 66s, Cumberland cut a slow sale at 62s to 63s. Long cut Hams in salt are saleable at 66s to 68s for sizes 13 lbs to 13 lbs.

Butter—Imports of Irish 169 firkins. Arrived to-day from Cork about 120 firkins. From the Continent by direct steamers 7,848 casks were reported against 7,518 last year; from France via Southampton and Railway 11,635 packages against 11,384 last year, none from America. Not much Irish remaining and prices are irregular as holders desire a clearance. For Canadian there is so little enquiry prices are almost nominal, our quotations are the asking rates. For so far the change to cold weather has not checked supplies of Foreign. To-day Friesland sells at 120 to 124s, Zwoile and Kempen 112s to 120s, Danish and Kiel 70s to 127s. (New Milk Kiel 120s to 133s.) Bosch 74s to 106s, Leer 104s to 110s, Jersey 112s, 120s, to 128s, Normandy 119s, 120s, 134s to 144s, Morlaix 98s to 102s, and Spanish 90s to 96s. The weather all last week was dry and cold, to-day cold with showers of sleet.

LONDON CORN MARKET.

Market is firm. English wheat, 1s to 2s more asked. No business done. Foreign firm. Oats firm, with moderate sale. Barley, beans, and peas firm, at last week's prices.

Weather very cold, with snow. English wheat in small supply and is dearer. Foreign has a good sale at 1s to 2s advance since last Monday. Maize and barley 6d dearer with good consumptive demand. Flour quiet. Peas and beans firm, but slow. Oats no dearer, but very firm. Floating cargoes—No fresh arrivals. Wheat 2s dearer since this day week. Maize 6d dearer—80s paid for Italian.
